From the Office of Civil Rights: "In classifying the allegations, look to the likely motives of the alleged harasser, and not the actual status of the alleged victim."

- Harassment or bullying on the basis of sex includes, sexual harassment or bullying and gender-based harassment or bullying:
- Sexual harassment or bullying is unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature, such as unwelcomed sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, non-verbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature.
 - Gender-based harassment or bullying is nonsexual intimidation or abusive behavior toward a student, based on the student's actual or perceived sex, including harassment based on gender identity, gender expression, and nonconformity with gender stereotypes.

REP: To be used when a student reports an offense where they were the victim but no responsible party can be identified and the report cannot be confirmed or investigated further. Should NOT be used for all students who make reports.

FAL: To be used when a student makes a report that is later determined to be false. Can include a victim (typically the student who was the subject of the false report).
